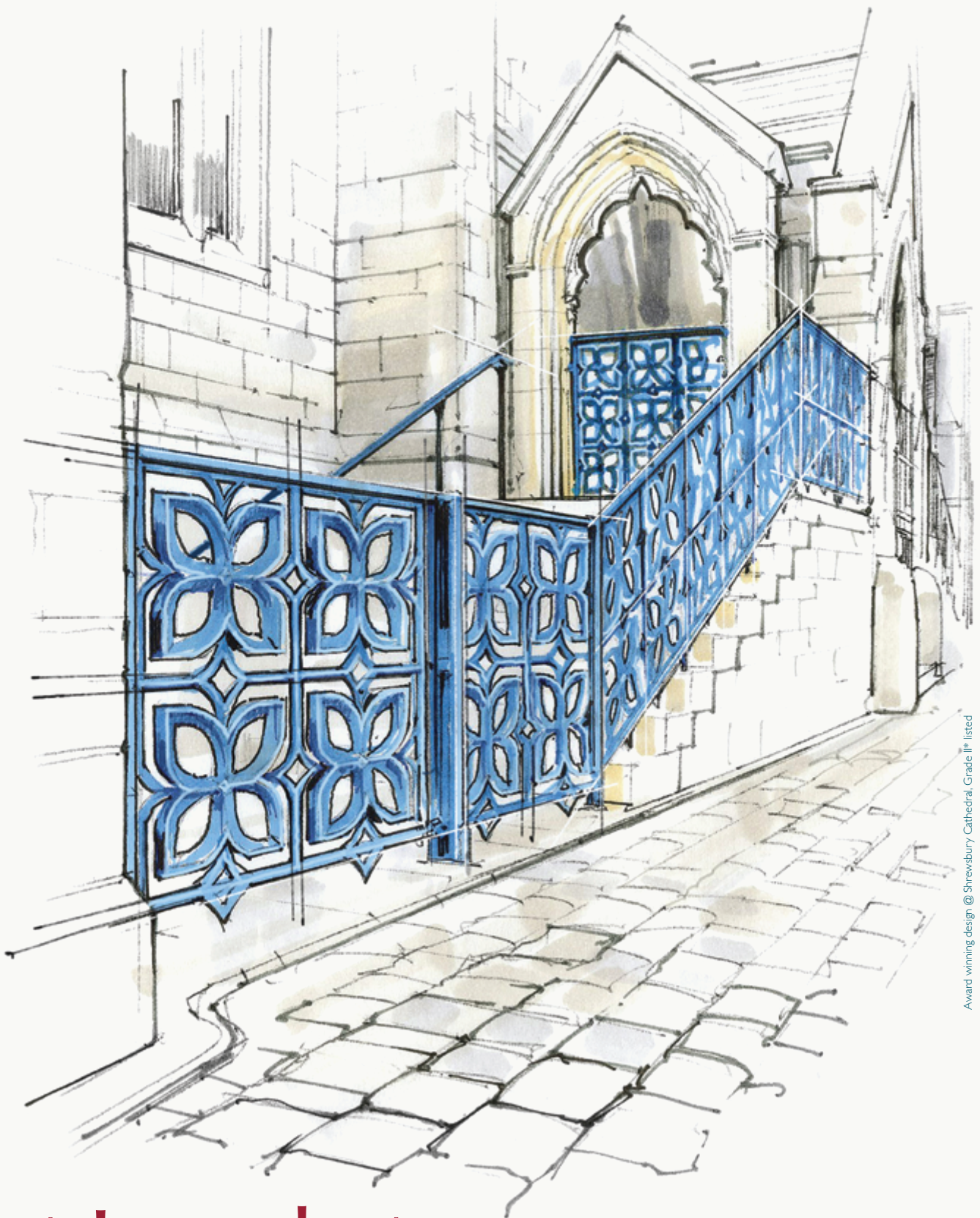

Fitting the New to the Old

Designing new ironwork for heritage settings

The heritage protection system is designed to manage change, not prevent it. It is acceptable to enhance the historic environment with new work, be it traditional or contemporary in style.

Our design approach is informed by a variety of considerations including:

- character, significance and value
- responding to a setting
- sympathetic design
- impact
- enhancement

These five key points are crucial to establishing the design brief and aesthetic direction, be it traditional or contemporary. As each project is unique, the best approach will vary depending on the context.

Design options

The following illustrates four different design approaches that fall into two main categories - Historical and Modern. Used in conjunction with our five key points this framework gives a starting point for prompting discussions so that the design brief and aesthetic direction can be established.

Historical

This approach is especially relevant where most of the original historic features are present with only specific elements missing.

Modern

Contemporary design is particularly appropriate where there is no clear historical evidence or reference for the new work, and where the desired objective of a historic setting is not only to maintain the existing character, but also to allow for its evolution. If done well, this approach creates a dialogue between ancient and modern that aims to lift the value and meaning of both.



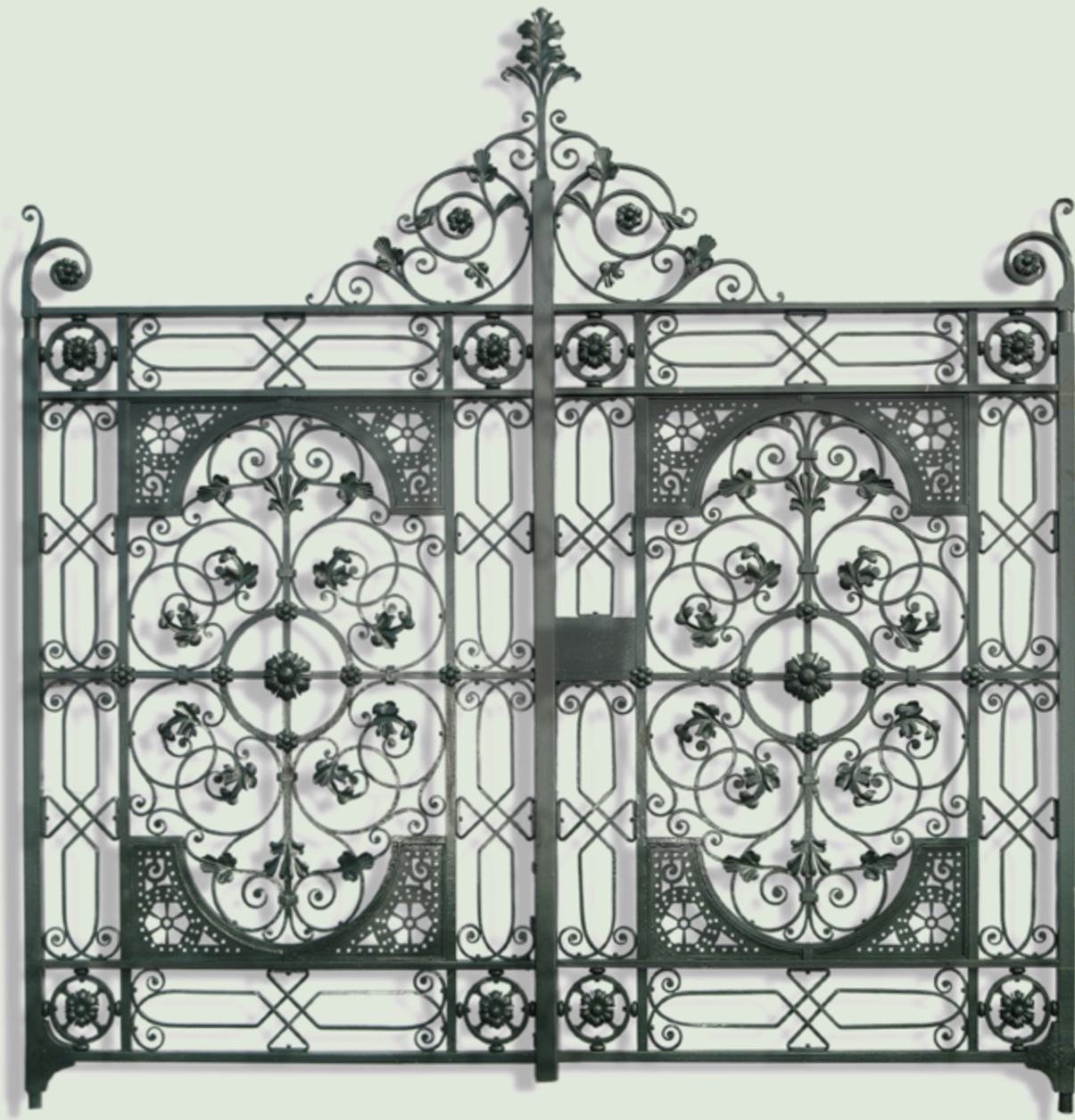

Restore original design

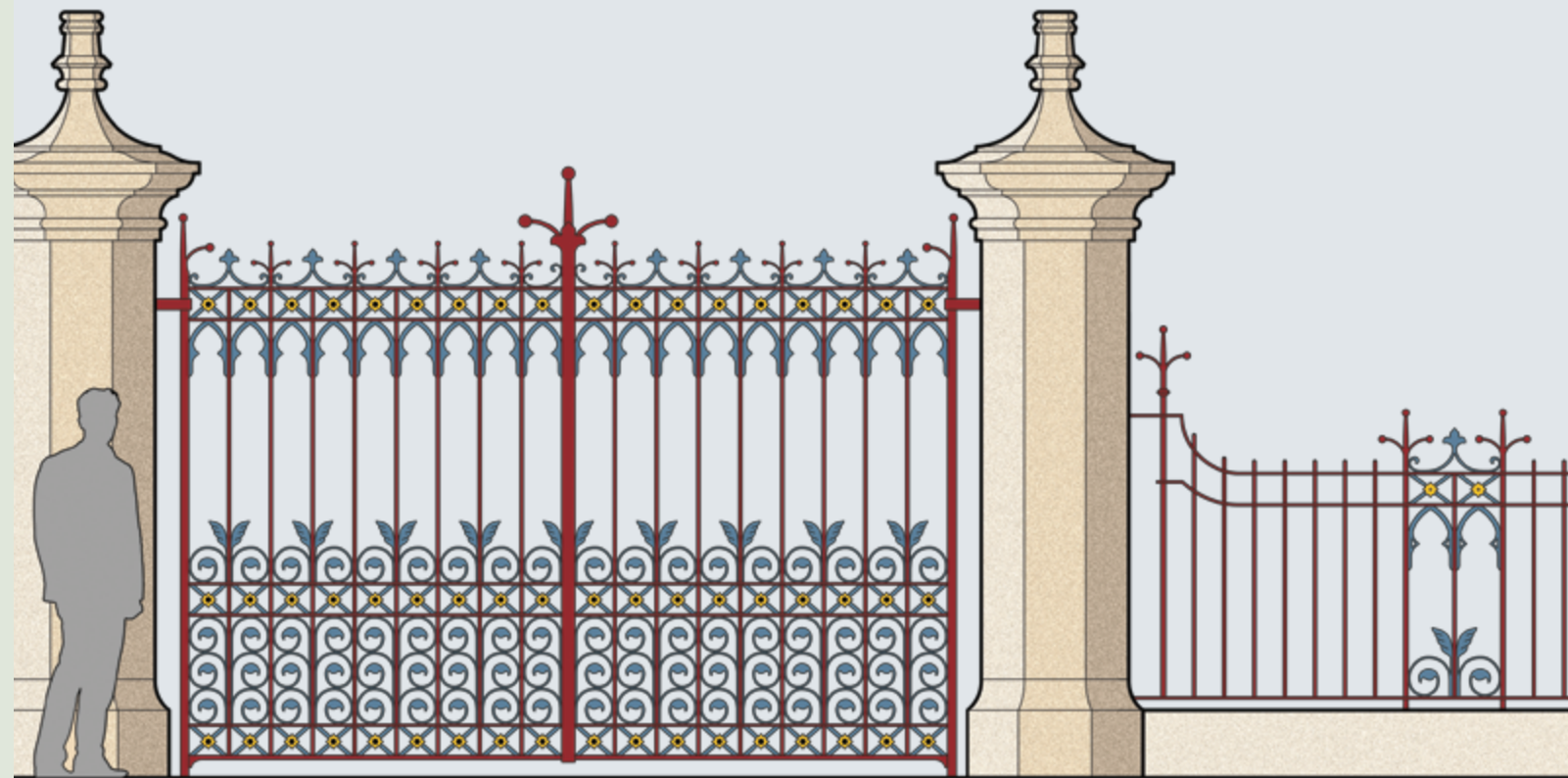


Replacement gates at Grade II listed Weston Park South East entrance, Sheffield

Informed by historical photographs, we designed these new gates to replace the originals which had been stolen. The quality of the archival evidence was high enough to enable the overall design to be accurately replicated, but authentically re-creating the detailing relied on our knowledge of period characteristics and techniques. Following the restoration, the entrance is now configured as it was in 1875 when Weston Park was opened to the public.

New gates to complement the c1900 south entrance at Grade II listed Barnes Park, Sunderland

With no direct historical references to replicate, our replacement gate design is a modern interpretation of a period style, as opposed to an accurate historical design. The new design incorporates decorative elements from the original railings that we reconfigured for their new purpose. Our understanding of period style and traditional techniques enabled us to create a design with an authentic feel. Although not an original feature, the new gates establish a better impression of how the entrance was originally intended to be perceived.

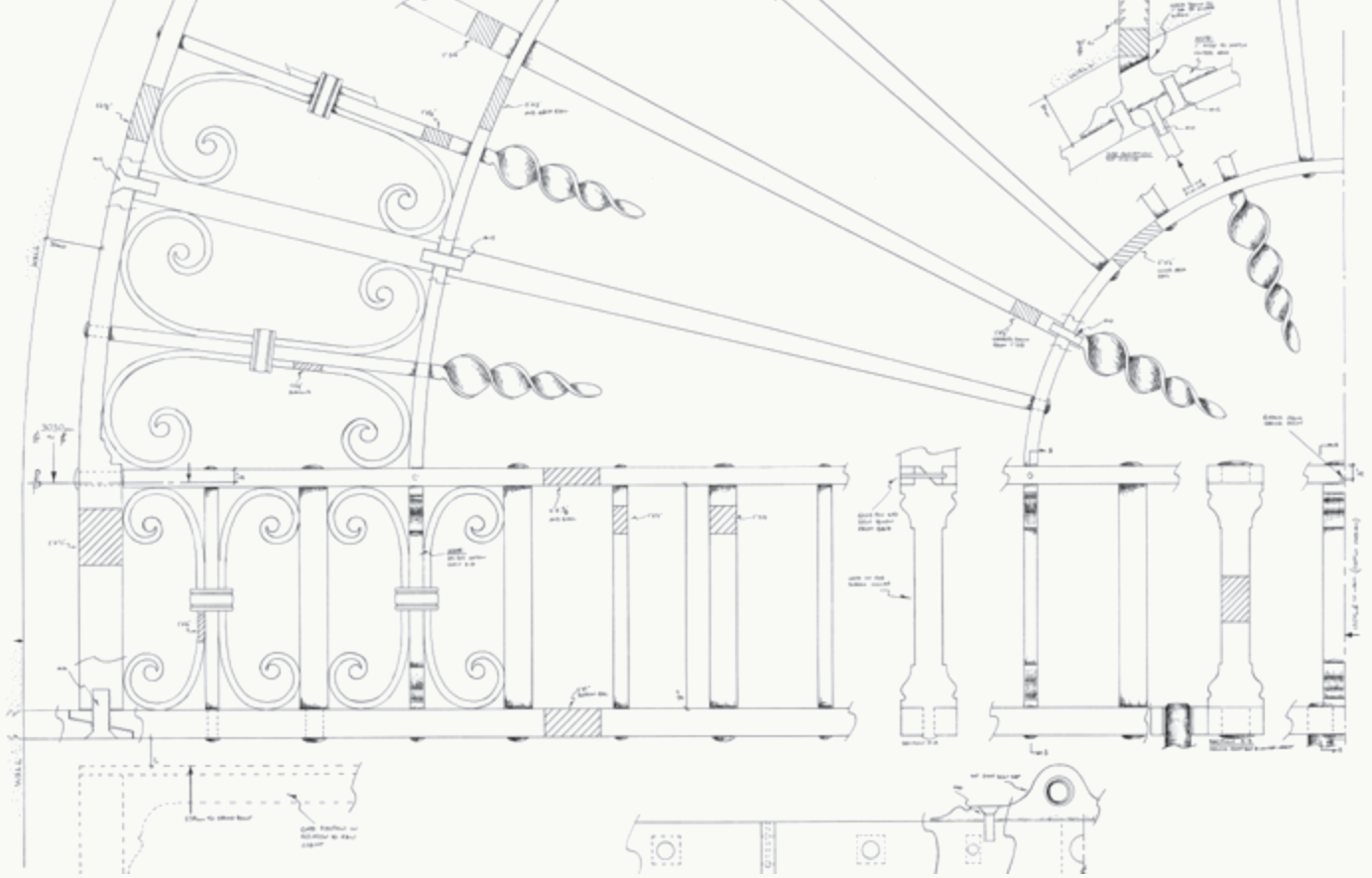
Balustrading & Gates for the new front entrance to Grade II* listed Shrewsbury Cathedral

An award-winning design inspired by traditional style references, this modern interpretation of the pointed quatrefoil, with its prominent yet refined form, sympathetically adds to the Cathedral's evolutionary story. It's symbolic of both Catholic faith and the cathedral's Gothic architect, EW Pugin, who used it in abundance within the interior. Made from cast iron and painted cobalt blue in representation of the Virgin Mary, to whom the cathedral is dedicated.



Gate for Carnaby Street within the Soho conservation area of Westminster, London

This gate uses our modern-day approach to design and is a freeform response to its context. Although first built in 1682, Carnaby Street's iconic heritage was established in the 1960s when it became an icon of Swinging London. Referencing this, our design is inspired by the bold geometric patterns of this era. The busy open framework, with random infills, also helps realise the gate's dual purpose of security at night and screening the property's air control vents during the day. Constructed using highly skilled fabrication techniques, it has a clean sophisticated finish without any unsightly welding. Its colouring comes from the use of polished stainless steel with glass inserts, complementing the colour scheme of the rest of the building.
